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#### REPORT OF OPERATIONS - GERMANY

#### PART IV - NONTH OF MARCH

#### REPORT ON SUPPLY AND EVACUATION

#### I - SUPPLY:

a. Supply Operations :

(1) During the period supply was difficult at times due to the rapid movement of the Division and attachments through Western and Central Germany. Advance Class I & III truckheads were established close to the forward elements at all times. Due to the long supply lines, only supplemental operational rations were issued from the Army supply points. Extraordinary effort on the part of all supply echelons made the flow of supplies to the combat troops possible.

(3) All issues of type "C", "K" and "10-1" rations were supplemented by issues of coffee, milk, sugar, heat units and vitamin pills. In some instances, fresh beef was an added supplement.

(4) Water was plentiful and easil accessable to the troops.

h. CLASS V:

# II - ORDNANCE MAINTENANCE & SUPPLY:

(1) 3rd Echelon Maintenance of motor vehicles was heavy, due to poor oads and a hilly terrain. In addition, during the first half of this period, it was necessary to make a 180 mile (round trip) to the supporting depot, for

(2) Twelve vehicles or 6% of the Division T/E allowance were lost due

to enemy action.

(3) The following items of spare and replacment parts were critical during the period: Engine Assys., GMC and Ford; Brake Lining, GMC; Hot patches; Tires, 6.00x16 and 7.50x20; Tubes, 6.00x16 and 7.50x20; Firing Mechanism, M1, for the 155mm Howitzer, Ml.

#### III - EVACUATION:

(1) The evacuation of casualties during the past month was effected eatisfactorily. However, the evacuation of casualties was complicated by the rapid advance of combat troops, two major river crossings, the daily moving and leapfrogging of all Divisional Medical units. The Division supporting Field Hospital, because of the rapid advance, was left considerably to the rear at times; in such incidents, for non-transportable cases, use was made of other Divisional field units on our flanks.

(2) Numerous German hospitals were over-run during the period; patients were checked and those ready for duty turned over to the Provost Warshal; remaining patients were not evacuated but placed under guard and reported to Corps for further processing and supply. A few German soldier wounded found in Civilian hospitals were removed to nearest German Military Hospitals.


(3) Medical supplies were adequate and easily obtained.

(3) This section also furnished parts for repair of lanterns, units fire and stoves 1 and 2 burner within the Division.

(4) A large number of enemy armored vehicles and Arty pieces were captured or destroyed during the period, including 6 tanks, 2 SP guns, 79 Arty pieces and 145 misc types of motor transportation. Other misc items included 3 steamboats, 41 locomotives and trains with all types of supplies.

### VI - TRAFFIC:

(1) During the period, traffic conditions in the Division area improved over the preceding period due to better roads and improved weather conditions.

## VII - SERVICE TROOPS & TRAINS:

(1) Service troops and trains continued to function smoothly. Rapid advancement by the forward elements necessitated long hauls, but all classes of supply were available to all Divisional and attached troops.

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#### PART IV - MONTH OF APRIL

#### REPORT OF SUPPLY AND EVACUATION

#### I - SUPPLY:

a. Supply Operations:

(1) During the period the Division and attached units moved rapidly through the Thuringian Wald and then to the Czechoslovakian border. Supply was difficult at times, due to long supply lines. Class I and III was plentiful, but Class II & IV supplies were not available in sufficient quantity to take care of the needs for them. Very few class "B" rations were available which necessitated the issue of operational rations to all units.

b. Class I:

(1) Truckhead distribution by means of advance Class I a III supply points was made to all Division units and attached troops. Pations were distributed on the following basis:

(2) Due to conditions of supply, very few items of FX issue were available during this period.

(3) Supplemental rations were inadequate for the month of April.

#### c. Class II:

. (1) Due to long supply lines and the stocks in the Class II depots, a very limited amount of Class II supply was drawn during the period.

d. Class III:

(1) Gasoline consumption averaged 5.7 gals per gas-consuming vehicle per day. The following is a total of all gasoline, oil and lubricants issued to the Division and attached units during the period:

- (2) Gasoline amounted to an average daily issue of 12,492 gals. This was an increase of 2,217 gals. daily.
- (3) There was a very critical shortage of diesel and #30 grade oil during this period.

(4) Total consumption of gasoline since "D" Day is 2,651,920 gals.

#### e. Class IV:

(1) There was a decrease of cleaning and preserving material and stationery, and office supplies issued to the Division and attached units due to a limited supply in the Army depots.

#### f. Personal Effects:

- (1) Personal effects of 83 individuals were processed during this period
- (2) There were replies to 78 inquiries of personal effects that passed through this section.

(1) Division Signal Supply, postal section, Division Special Service, Division PX. Aed Cross, USO show and reinforcements were attached to the QM Com-

pany during this period.

(2) Due to the fluid situation on the entire front, small bands of ene troops harassed and attacked supply vehicles. Supply trains of the Division and attached units had to be escorted by armored vehicles to the Army depots. Several men were killed or wounded and several vehicles were destroyed.

II - CADNANCE MAINTENANCE & SUPPLY:

(1) 3d Echelon Haintenance of motor vehicles was heavy during the period due to: Long supply hauls, rapid tactical advance and lack of unit replacements.

(2) Fourteen (14) vehicles or .6% of the Division T/E allowance were lost

due to enemy action.

(3) The following items of spare and replacment parts were critical during the period: Engine assemblies, GAD, Ford, and Dodge; Brake lining; Ford and GAD; Tires, 6.00x16 and 7.50x20; Axle assys., banjo and split for GAD.

#### III - EVACUATION:

(1) The rapid and efficient evacuation of casualties during the period was unaffected by difficult terrain and a rapidly moving tactical situation.

- (2) Whenever available, trucks were utilized to keep the Field Hospital as near as possible to the Clearing Station. Good cooperation is noted through all echelons of medical evacuation.
- (3) Numerous German Military hospitals were over-run during period. Patients were screened for duty status and food and medical supplies were also checked for availability.
  - (4) Medical supplies were adequate and easily available.

(4) A large number of enemy armored vehicles and Arty pieces, were captured or destroyed during the period, including 13 tanks, 15 Arty pieces and 66 misc types of motor transport. Other misc items included 120 airplanes, 41 locomotives and trains, 2000 parachutes, and several thousand tires and tubes of all sizes.

#### VI - TRAFFIC:

(1) During the period, traffic conditions were favorable. The roads and weather conditions remained satisfactory.

#### VII - SEAVICE THOOPS & THAINS:

(1) Service troops and trains continued to function smoothly. Aspid divancement by the forward elements necessitated long hauls, but necessary supplies were available to all Divisional and attached troops.

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
