


Also...the reunions will never again enjoy the joy and delight of our "one-of-a-kind", lovable old soldier, Irvin [Irv] Kaine. He kept us all entertained, and we loved him dearly. Look for more information about Leon Crenshaw and Irv Kaine later in this newsletter. They truly were the "face of the Association" in many ways. Another loss is George [Bill] McCarthy who attended Reunions for years. He recently remarried after the loss of his wife several years ago. It put a new spring in his step, & it was great to see his happiness. These losses are occurring in greater numbers and frequency as our Greatest Generation Heros age. So, love and cherish the time we have left with them, and honor them throughout the reunion time in Fort Worth.

At the 2012 Reunion, the Executive Committee voted to send a "personal note to each member" via first class mail. The purpose of this endeavor was to help "clean-up" our roster as well as encourage the members to keep their dues current. It has become apparent that the U.S. Postal Service is not fulfilling their obligation to return undeliverable newsletters as our permit states. We began with 2163 names on the roster - to date, that number is now 2031! The project resulted in a LOT of dues payments, both for 2012-2013 & for 2013-2014, AND...it cleaned up the roster. By the way, the mailing house incurred my extreme displeasure because they sent the Fall newsletter out with NO designation as to whether or not you had paid your 2012-2013 dues. They had the information, but didn't use it!. It shouldn't happen again!

EDITOR'S NOTE: For this issue, I have chosen to print a message my late father, Rev. Daniel Hager [May 26, 1914-February 12, 2010] wrote in June 1980 for the Evans Valley Bible Church Newsletter in Rogue River, OR., where he was the Pastor at the time. He was a godly man, and he knew the Bible thoroughly. He also lived his faith every day - he "practiced what he preached". I will always miss him.

What Is So Important About the Bible?"

"For one thing, the Bible itself gives the reason for the importance of it. God Himself is the Author. It is true, He did use some 40 men from various walks of life over a period of many centuries to record what He wanted written. In 2 Peter 1:21 we read: *'For prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: But holy men of God spoke as they were moved by the Holy Spirit.'* And in 2 Timothy 3:16 we read: *'All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness.'* What is more, God's word is unchangeable and eternal. The Lord Jesus said, *'Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away.'* [Matthew 24:35] Psalms 119:89 says: *'Forever, O Lord, your word is settled in Heaven.'* -- You may reject, ridicule, or ignore the Word of God, but one day every one of us will stand in the presence of God and be judged by it, not by man's ideas. The Lord Jesus made this clear when He said: *'The words that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last day.'* [John 12:48] -- The Bible bears witness to the one true God, the Creator and Sustainer of the universe, and revealing to us His true character. It tells us of the origin of man, his course and his destiny. It presents one continuous story of God's love for sinful man and His plan of redemption for man, through the sacrificial work of His eternal Son, the Lord Jesus Christ. He came into this world, born of the virgin Mary, lived a sinless life, then voluntarily gave Himself to die on the cross for the full payment of our sins, and was raised from the dead in a literal, physical body. He was seen, felt, and conversed with many, and then ascended to God the Father's right hand. -- The Bible is essential to faith, apart from which we cannot please God. Romans 10:17 says, *'So then, faith comes by hearing and hearing by the Word of God.'* We cannot be born into God's family without it. 1 Peter 1:23 states: *'Being born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the Word of God, which lives and abides forever.'* No other book tells us how we may know the way to heaven for sure, and also in no uncertain terms, lets us know that by not receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Savior, we must spend eternity in hell. -- The Bible is God's message to us. It is His 'love letter to us'. He created us and wants us to know that which is best for us for 2 time and eternity. Daniel Hager, Pastor"

We Remember & Honor 2 of our Most Loyal 90th Division WW II Heroes

Leon Crenshaw

June 3, 1919 – March 21, 2013

Le Crenshaw's many friends most likely know that he was a true gentleman, a gifted storyteller, a patriot, a Christian, a Democrat, and a fine historian. He was all that and so much more. Le grew up on a farm in Independence, MO, the oldest of five children, and the lessons and values of that rural upbringing shaped his life. He could grow anything well and liked to experiment with new varieties. Marianne would hand him a seed and say, "Just bong it in the ground. It'll grow for you." Last week, he was planning to grow a Tabasco pepper plant from seed. He could grow tomatoes in concrete!

He knew all about animal husbandry and had a heart for all animals. He could speak their language, too. Once he declared that he had identified twelve different sounds his flock of geese used to communicate. He called his beef steers by name and they came running.

As a youth, he excelled at baseball, often organizing games in his grandpa's farm fields. He loved the world champion STL Cardinals. He also played bridge well and was a crack bowler, once rolling a 298 and earning a golden pin in Falls Church, VA. An expert marksman, he shot skeet and hunted, bagging duck and pheasant in various states and wild boar and quail in Cyprus and Italy.

Early on, his domestic skills were minimal, although he often fried us up egg sandwiches with dill pickles when we returned late from an outing. Usually, when Marianne was away, he'd fix his one special dish called "Two, two, and two." That was two hotdogs, two potatoes, and two eggs all boiled together in one pot. Clever. Later, though, he mastered a mean chili and a tasty bean soup and loved to prepare them for the girls.

Celebrating holidays and decorating the house were his delight, whether creating a scarecrow scene at harvest time at the farm, adorning the mantel at Christmas, or hiding Easter eggs all over. As a grandpa on the farm, he shared his grandkids' fun riding the hay wagon, catching barn kittens, sledding the hill, or driving the riding mower.

A natural leader and a bit of a rascal, Le laughed a lot and liked pulling pranks, though to the end he denied knowing how his Model A ended up on the porch of the administration building at Mizzou during his college days. He and Marianne built a community of friends wherever they lived, giving generously to all and receiving in kind. On his last day, Le was sharing jokes, watching NCAA basketball, making bets with his beloved "seeing eye girl" Kate Harper, and looking forward to spring. He had convinced us all that he would live forever - and in our hearts - he will.



He served with the Tough 'Ombres during World War II. I believe that he was a 1SGT with the 359th Inf. Regiment and made the landing on Utah Beach on June 6, 1944. He was wounded at least twice during his tour with the 90th and served with the division for the duration of the war. George went on to serve in the Army until 1953 when he retired as a WOJG [Warrant Officer Junior Grade]. He often talked about General VanFleet which leads me to believe that his unit was at one time assigned to the 8th Infantry Regiment, 4th Division. George passed away in 1987 when I was stationed in Korea, and I have lost touch with the rest of the family. As with most veterans, George down-played the role he had in combat and would tell stories of how he got busted in rank, or of some prank that he pulled off. As a retired Army Officer and combat veteran, I know that his 24 years of service amounted to more than just a footnote. I am very familiar with the exploits of the 90th Division in WW II. I had my camera on hand and quickly took this picture, even though my camera was set for distance. Many years later, we met a friend on a D-Day Anniversary Tour. I showed the pictures to this buddy, and he told me that the man was a doctor. He gave me his address, and I sent him these pictures. I received a very nice reply from him. He was so thankful for the pictures. I asked him if we could meet at one of our reunions. He said his wife was handicapped, and he could not leave her alone. Rocco N. Gedaro, 87



SOUTH PORTLAND - "Decorated World War II hero, Staff Sergeant, Rocco N. Gedaro, 87, of Boothby Avenue, died Wednesday, Sept. 21, 2011 at Maine Medical Center with his loving family by his side. Rocky was born in Portland on Feb. 9, 1924, the son of Antonio and Marie Inrieri Gedaro. He attended local schools and graduated from Portland High School. After high school, Rocky entered the United States Army on Nov. 1, 1943, at Camp Croft, SC. In April of 1944, he arrived in Plymouth, England to train for the Normandy Invasion. On June 8, 1944, he landed in Normandy, France, two days [continued]

after the Normandy Invasion. He was one of the first replacements for the 90th Infantry Division C 357 Regiment. Rocky fought every battle from June 8, 1944 to Jan. 13, 1945 until a severe case of frostbite caused him to be hospitalized in England for three months, after which he was assigned to a non-combat engineering outfit in Southern France. When the war ended in Europe in September, 1945, Rocky was on a ship headed back to the United States. He fought in battle campaigns that included Normandy, Northern France, Rhineland, Ardennes, and Battle of the Bulge. For his brave service, he was awarded the military's Bronze Star Medal, fourth highest honor for bravery, heroism or meritorious service in defense of his nation. After returning from his combat action, Rocky met and married Betty Jane Irvine. He went to work for the United States Post Office, retiring after more than thirty years of employment. He had a side business, Rocks T.V. Repair, that he ran for many years. Rocky's children often commented that he could fix anything. Rocco and Betty Jane enjoyed spending time at the family cottage on Little Sebago Lake, which included a huge stone fireplace made of rocks that he and his children gathered in the family station wagon.... Rocky was a member of the South Portland VFW Post #832; the Harold T. Andrews American Legion Post No. 17 of Portland; Portland Elks Lodge, and the Italian Heritage Center in Portland." Smith, Charles Byron, Jr. Obituary



ORONO - Charles Byron Smith Jr., 92, husband of the late Julia A. Smith, died Oct. 4, 2011, at an Orono health care facility. He was born April 30, 1919, in Orono, the only child of Charles Byron Smith and Cora (Buchanan) Smith, who died young. He was lovingly brought up by his stepmother, Beryl Perry Smith, who later adopted him. Charlie attended Orono public schools, graduated from Orono High School in 1936 and the University of Maine in 1941, with a Bachelor of Science in poultry husbandry. He later earned a Master in Education degree in education at Maine, followed by a sixth year and additional graduate studies at the University of Connecticut. He was a member of Alpha Gamma Rho and served four years in ROTC - and OTCS, graduating as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army Infantry. He trained in California, Louisiana, Arizona, and Abilene, Texas, where, as a first lieutenant, he became commander of G Company, 357 Infantry Regiment of the reactivated 90th Division. While in Abilene, Texas, he married Julia Alice Smith, college classmate from Parsonfield. The unit division trained in England and entered France on D & E Day, serving under Gen. George Patton across Europe - two Moselle River Crossings - to Czechoslovakia. Charlie was discharged in 1945 as a major in the U.S. Army Reserve with three Purple Heart awards, the Silver Star, the Bronze Star with V for valor, the Division Award Croix de Guerre, plus numerous awards for engagements. He was a life member of OMOR American Legion Post 84 and served for several years in its once nationally recognized honor guard. Charlie taught vocational agriculture for eight years at Hermon High School, where he also taught On The Farm training courses - government program, to local veterans engaged in or returned to farming. He was Hermon's first fire chief & then a volunteer group, Cub Scout Master, school building committee member for the new elementary school, and farmed 200 acres in Hermon. He taught in a three-man Vo-Ag program in New Salem, Mass., before joining a regional vocational agriculture center at Woodrow Wilson High School, Middletown, Conn. He later became director of audiovisual services for the city of Middletown (Conn.) school system until he retired to his hometown of Orono in 1978. He was an active reader for years. In Orono, Charlie carried on part time farming on his father's and grandfather's farm on Main Street. He was active in the Legion, the Methodist church, Orono Public Library, Orono Historical Society, and Page Farm and Home Museum. He belonged to Maine Sons of the American Revolution, Lynde Lodge - later transferred to Orono, and Anah Shrine. 





Pierson commissioner died last Wednesday

STANTON — Montcalm County commissioners are honoring one of their own.

Carl Paepke died last Wednesday at his Pierson home after fighting lung cancer. He was 86 years old.

At Monday's regular Board of Commissioners meeting, commissioners unanimously approved a resolution honoring Paepke's years of service to the county, along with a special plaque.

Paepke joined the Board of Commissioners on Jan. 1, 1995. He served as chairman of the Parks & Recreation Committee and the Solid Waste Committee. He also served on the Finance & Personnel Committee, Health & Human Services Committee, Law Enforcement & Courts Committee and as a representative to the Michigan District Health Department Board.

Also at Monday's meeting, Commissioner Ron Retzlaff of Crystal proposed renaming Flat River Nature Park in Paepke's honor, as Paepke was chairman of the Parks & Recreation Committee.

Commissioners unanimously agreed to rename the Montcalm Township park as Carl Paepke Flat River Nature Park. "I think it's a wonderful idea," said Commissioner Carl Johnson of Montcalm Township. Paepke was in his 18th year as commissioner for District 5, which encompasses Maple Valley, Pierson and Pine townships. Commissioners will appoint someone to fill the remainder of Paepke's term, which expires at the end of this year. Candidates must



be a resident of Maple Valley, Pierson or Pine townships to be eligible to apply for the position. Applications are available online at montcalm.org or from Controller-Administrator Chris Hyzer's office in the Administrative Building (old courthouse) in Stanton.

The deadline to apply for the position is 4 p.m. May 7. Commissioners will appoint a new District 5 commissioner at a special meeting scheduled for 1 p.m. May 14.

Johnson reminded his fellow commissioners that Paepke, who was a Republican, will be honored

Fern Leona Bergdale, 103, former Sioux Falls resident of many years, passed away in Houston, Texas, on February 19, 2013. She joins the love of her life, husband Harold, who preceded her in death in 1999 after 61 years of marriage. Fern was born April 14, 1909, in Hawarden, Iowa, to James Henry and Mary (Christensen) McAninch. She grew up on her family's farm outside Hawarden, and graduated from Hawarden High School in 1925 with a "normal training" certificate, after two years of high school teacher training. She began teaching at age 18 in a one-room country school outside Hawarden, a position she held for twelve years.

Fern and Harold were married in 1939, after Harold's graduation from USD Law School, and the newlyweds set out for Los Angeles, California, to make their permanent home. Jobs were scarce; Harold drove a street car, and Fern worked in the Sears catalog order department. They saved to build a small house, which was almost finished, but they never got to live there. Harold had completed R.O.T.C. officer training in college, and when Pearl Harbor was attacked in December 1941, he was immediately called to active duty in the Army.

Fern followed her husband to Abilene, Texas, for his pre-war training, and their lives as a military family began. Harold was shipped to Normandy with his beloved 90th Infantry Division, landing on Utah Beach on D-Day in 1944. Fern served her time on the home front, returning to her parents' home in Hawarden to wait out the war. When Harold returned in 1945, they moved to Sioux Falls. When he was recalled in the early 1950s, Fern and their daughter Lorna followed him to Stuttgart, Germany, where he served in the Occupation Forces for four years.

The family returned to Sioux Falls in 1956, where Fern served for many years as the office manager of Harold's law practice and insurance agency; they retired in the late 1980s. They were active, devoted members of Central Baptist Church in Sioux Falls for more than four decades. They had many friends, an active social life, and traveled frequently. Nearly every winter after their retirement, they spent several months in Sun City, Arizona, where they enjoyed the company of many of their Sioux Falls snowbird friends.

Fern moved to Houston, Texas in 2000, at the age of 91, to be close to her daughter and grandson. She remained remarkably healthy and active until very recently; she had her own apartment, kept up on current events, and enjoyed numerous excursions, shopping trips and dinners out. One of the highlights of her life was her 100th birthday party in 2009, a four-day event attended by many relatives and friends. Fern is survived by daughter Lorna Gilbert and grandson Steven Gilbert, both of Houston; and by numerous nieces and nephews. In addition to her husband Harold, her grandson Jeff Gilbert preceded her in death, as did her two sisters, Stella McAninch Patrick of Hawarden, Iowa, and Lavon McAninch Bergdale of Alcester, S.D.



I shouted to him: 'Say, there, is that a Texas/Oklahoma 90th Infantry Division cap you're wearing?' -- 'Yes, it is', he answered. During WW II that was my Dad's outfit. Mr. Richards told me it was also his Dad's outfit. I told him my Dad never came home, so we never got to see each other. It turns out that Mr. Richards is the Assistant Historian for the 90th Inf. I gave him all the information about my father. I knew absolutely nothing about Company K of the 357th Regt. in the 90th. I only knew William L. Phillips of Missouri had fought in the Hedgerows of France. He was killed June 19, 1944 and is buried in France. A few days later, I received a call from Mr. Richards. 'Vance, I have names and addresses of three men from Company K still living.' I contacted all three by telephone. All three men are in their 90s. Two of the elderly men could remember almost nothing. But when I contacted Bill Munsch, he was alert and interested in my story. We began writing each other. He had a copy of his and my Dad's outfit made and sent it to me - no easy task for a man in his 90s. The picture arrived and there was my Dad - young and strong and handsome. Only five men to his left stood my new found friend, Bill Munsch of Allentown, PA. So, after almost seventy years, I've been able to fill a void in my life, thanks to Bill and his wife, Marjorie. I'm sixty seven years old now. I have three grown children and ten grandchildren. Hopefully, my father will one day meet us. Vance Phillips" [Ed.: What a wonderful story! Claude E. Lovett Jr. 357/G

Born June 12, 1921 --- Died May 8, 2012

Claude E. Lovett, Jr. was born June 12, 1921 in a farm house on the Homer Creek Stock Farm located in the Neal community near Eureka, Kansas. He died on May 8, 2012. He attended Tonovay Public School for grades 1 thru 3, all of which were in a one room schoolhouse. In 1930, the family moved to their ranch in the Texas panhandle and Claude attended 4th thru 8th grades in Stratford. Due to family moves, he went to high school in Channing and Dumas, where he graduated in 1939 following which he enrolled in the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, now Texas A&M University. Claude was a life member of the Century Club of the Association of former students and the San Antonio A&M club. He graduated from A&M in January 1943 and went directly into the army, assigned to the infantry officer candidate school at 90th infantry division, Camp Barkley, Abilene Texas. While a freshman at Texas A&M, he and his wife to be me on a blind date February 10, 1940 and on August 21, 1943 he and Mary Helen Rosener of Temple, Texas were married in Abilene. The 90th division moved to the Mojave Dessert in California for maneuvers and then to Fort Dix, NJ in March 1944. The division departed for England and on June 8, 1944, D day +2 landed on Utah beach in Normandy. As a rifle platoon leader and company executive officer, in combat, Claude was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, two Silver Stars, two [Bronze Stars](#), [Purple Heart](#), Combat Infantryman Badge, three Campaign Stars, the Beachhead Landing Arrowhead, and the French Croix De Guerre. He was wounded by German machine gun fire November 12, 1944, spent some three years in four different military hospitals, and was retired from Brooke General Hospital (now BAMC) October 15, 1947 for permanent disability with the rank of Captain. Memberships in military associations include the Legion of Valor, Military Order of the Purple Heart, Military Officers Association of America and the 90th Division Association. Claude started work January 9, 1948 in San Antonio for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company as a rural salesman. On October 31, 1948 his only child, daughter Claudia, was born in San Antonio. After several different jobs in San Antonio he was the local manager in Crystal City and Harlingen then Division Commercial Engineer in Austin and Beaumont. In January, 1974, he returned to San Antonio as Advalorem Tax Manager from which job he retired on May 29, 1987. He was a life member of the Telephone Pioneers, Alamo Chapter. Claude was an active member in seven different Methodist churches as he moved to different cities. He has been a member of Windcrest United Methodist Church since 1974 where he served in many capacities including Head of Finance and Building Drives, Chairman of the Church Council and President of the Windcrest Methodist Men's organization. After retiring from Southwestern Bell, he worked for 10 years assisting people with income tax preparation under the volunteer income tax assistance program. Claude was predeceased by two brothers, Hubert and Robert, and sister Dorothy Scarbrough. Survivors include his wife, Helen, daughter Claudia Taylor and husband Gary of Dallas, grandson Blake Taylor and wife Lindsay, great grandson Luke Taylor, granddaughter Brittany Sawyer and husband Lee, sisters Maxine Adair of Levellend, Texas and Edith Roberds of Las Cruces, New Mexico, sister in law Ellen Lovett of Amarillo, Texas.

The family will receive visitors Wednesday, May 16, 2012 from 5PM to 8PM at Sunset Funeral Home. The funeral service will be Thursday, May 17, 2012 at 11:30am at Windcrest United Methodist Church. Burial with full military honors will follow at Ft. Sam Houston National Cemetery. 22

My wife Florence and I were eating at Chili's when two cute high school girls in uniform came to our table and thanked me for my service. I guess they suspected I had been in the service because of the way I saluted two boys, who were also in uniform, when they opened the door for us as we entered the restaurant. Then the man in charge of the Civil Air Patrol Cadet Unit asked me a few questions and for my phone number and said they were going to send me to Washington, DC on the Honor Flight.

30 Vets and 18 guardians left Phoenix May 22nd on Southwest Airlines and arrived in Baltimore, MD where a banquet was waiting for us at the Hilton Hotel where we were checked in for two nights.

Early the next morning our chartered bus took us to the WW2 memorial, the Lincoln, Korean, Vietnam, Iwo Jima, Navy, and Air Force memorials, and a tour of the Capital building. Then, we saw the Changing of the Guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington Cemetery, followed by another banquet at Ft. Myers.

Before we went to the airport to return home on May 24th, we went to Ft. McHenry where the Star Spangled Banner was written in 1814.

Exiting the plane back in Phoenix we were greeted with hundreds of people cheering and clapping and yelling, "Thank you for your service". The Civil Air Patrol color guard led us back past security where our families were waiting and also cheering. I bit my lip to avoid looking stupid, but when I saw Florence I lost it.

On June 2nd they had a reunion of our flight and the previous Honor Flight out of Phoenix. It was also my 87th birthday. They sang Happy Birthday to me, and they allowed me to tell this story... "We got on the ship to take us across the channel four days before D-Day on June 2, 1944 which was my 19th birthday. The guys sang Happy Birthday to me and they said if I live to see 20 I'll live to see 100. I'm on my way."

WW2 vets, if you haven't been to the WW2 Memorial and you would like to go, look up Honor Flight on the internet. It's a national program, and it's 100% free to WW2 vets.

Military Biography

Born: March 18, 1921

December 28, 1942: Inducted into the US Army

January 4, 1944: Transported to Camp Wolters near Mineral Wells for initial processing.

He was sent to Camp Perry in Ohio for Basic Training.

He was transferred to the 20th Armored Division, Cam Campbell, Kentucky as an instructor for truck driving.

Advanced infantry training was received at Fort Dix, New Jersey before departing for England on May 15, 1944.

He was assigned to K Company, 358th Infantry Regiment 90th Infantry Division after crossing the English Channel.

During the battle for Hill 122 he was severely wounded in his left jaw and left forearm. He was subsequently captured by the enemy. He was initially taken to Mortain France for first aid and later transported to Rennes France where he was confined to a prisoner of war hospital until being liberated on August 5, 1944 by American Forces.

He was then transported to England for extensive medical care and ultimately redeployed to the US for medical discharge.

Honorable Discharged: August 4, 1945

Gedaro, Rocco [Rocky]. 357/C - died 9/21/11 -

"This is a picture of a piece of shrapnel [shown in comparison to a dime] that embedded itself in my water canteen in the hedgerows of Normandy, France. I reached for a drink of water, during a lull in the shelling & heard this rattling noise in my canteen. It was this piece of shrapnel from a German artillery 88 Howitzer. This happened about June 10, '44. Notice how sharp the edges are. When a shell



lands, it explodes into all these small pieces of very hot steel, that scatter all over, and if they hit you, they tear a bad wound in your body. This injures or kills soldiers & civilians. I was very lucky that it hit my canteen & stopped in it. If it had hit a little lower or higher, I would have been seriously injured or killed. I carried this piece of shrapnel in my pocket throughout the war and keep it as a souvenir." [Ed.: This was sent in by Dan Sheridan.]

A Poem written by **Bill Rhodes, 358L** in August, 2007 - **Bill is now 95**, and we have printed many of his poems in the newsletters -

We Were Poor

Yes I guess we were poor,
we didn't have any of today's gadgets, that's for sure.
Yes we were poor in 1934,
But we had a big bear rug in the middle of the floor.

We had no phone or washing machine
and our only lamp burned kerosene.
Since we had no plumbing you see,
there could be nothing from the utility.

We got our milk straight from the cow,

Do The Knights
Ever Ride Away.

The Knights about which I chose to write is of course a play on words. I am not writing about the chivalrous men of the middle ages. I chose the word Knight in order to capitalize the word Night. And the Nights about which I have no option but to write, are the Nights I lived and remembered between July of 1945 and May of 1946. I know that I actually lived and experienced those Nights because the written history of the Regiment in which I served as a combat infantryman, confirms my remembrances.

1945-1946:

The foxhole is a lonely home. Sometimes I spend the Night there by myself, but most of the times I shared it with a fellow "Grunt" whom I do not know and will probably never get to know. Even if we have the time, we do not take the time to get acquainted. It is the first Night together and we both know, it may well be the last, so why bother---besides we're both too tired to talk. In a short while we'll begin our rotating "hour on and hour off" vigil for the Night. Tomorrow, or the day after tomorrow, or even the day after that, we will probably proceed to attack some hill, some dug in enemy position, some objective of some kind or another that will divide forever. Neither he nor I are overly friendly. Neither of us have any desire to lose another friend.

The explosions of artillery and mortar shells are consistent and almost constant. After a few days, we are able to distinguish the "incoming" from the "outgoing". Sometimes there is a pause between the explosions, as though they too, must take a breath. I cannot say that after a while, I got use to the explosions---It's only, as long as I can hear them, I know that I am not yet dead. The hole next to ours take a direct hit; either from an enemy shell, or one of our own that fell a little short. The identity of the shell is, at the moment, irrelevant, the two Grunts who were in the hole next door, no longer exist. There's a shoe that I don't remember seeing before. I did not check to see if there was a foot in it.

Orders came down to be ready to move out within the next hour. Under the cover of darkness and silence we moved to a forward position in closer proximity to the small village we were to attack at dawn. Any conversation between us, was very little and in whispers. We prayed that enemy artillery would not discover our presence. And thus we waited in silent fear until dawn was on the horizon, and the dreaded words "Lets go" was filtered through the ranks. Most of the time, the actual "attacks" were not as difficult as the waiting to do so. If the attack was indeed a surprise, the skirmish was usually a matter of minutes and the "Krauts" who were not dead or wounded, quickly retreated or surrendered.

After the attack, we would count our casualties and remember those who had fallen, and about whom we knew so little. And for the hundredth time, I would wonder why it was him and not me being carried to the rear in a litter sling. 'Tis a wonder never to be forgotten or understood. Most of the time in these attacks, I was firing my rifle at an

unseen enemy---He would become visible only when he came out of his hiding place with his hands above his head in surrender. If the attack was one that contained substantial resistance with a lot of small arms enemy fire, I would run and fire and hit the ground, look for cover and then get up and run and hit the ground and do the same thing over again until I finally got to the place to where we were supposed to go. Because of the physical training, (fourteen months stateside) I was probably in as good or better physical condition than anyone in our platoon, and as a result, the athletic requirements of combat was never much of a problem for me.

Sometimes the Nights were empty of moon and stars. When standing guard, the blackness would envelope me in a blanket of security; if I can't see him, I know that he can't see me. On such a Night filled with stillness, I would sometimes hear the very distant sounds of some other Division or some other Army, giving and receiving their respective calling cards. On such a Night, on guard behind a mound of ground or hedge, I would plant into my conscience, the exact location of my foxhole home. It would not be wise, while half asleep, to stumble into the wrong hole of another. To be shot by a member of your own Company would, not only be embarrassing, it would qualify you for the medal of stupidity, instead of the "Purple Heart".

It was the bright Nights with lots of stars and a full moon that would move the pulsations of your heart into a higher gear. In the quiet of such a Night, your imaginations saw and heard all kinds of things and movements. In such a night, you did not fall half asleep at your post; and when you subsequently lied in the same spot vacated by your roommate, you did not fall immediately asleep. Sleeping in the same spot as your predecessor, meant only, giving him back his raincoat that he had been using as a pillow and forming once again your own.

To any possible reader, it must seem a little strange that I should remember so vividly the Nights rather than the days in combat. Every day seemed like the day before and the day after, but many, many Nights held individual slots in my memory. I'll record here only a couple that were not recorded in "The First Few Hours and The First Few Days".

We had walked since Night had fallen and in the early morning hours we stopped to rest in some empty houses in a small village. In the house our squad occupied, we found some fresh German bread and butter and gorged ourselves accordingly. After weeks and weeks of living on K-rations only, our stomachs simply could not handle such tasty fair. Shortly afterward, we again began our walk to our pre-dawn attack positions. We walked and puked all the rest of the way.

On another Night, we had liberated a small town and two other GI's and myself shared a German home with an elderly German couple and two German soldiers who had surrendered to us. The couple served all of us some steamed potatoes and we ate together as a family and for a few wonderful moments, forgot the war that was going on all around us. It was only a few moments in another Night to remember. So not all Nights were bad and some indeed do ride away

90TH SOLDIER'S STORY...2



Two stories by the late Rocco [Rocky] Gedaro, 357/C - sent in by fiend, Daniel Sheridan

"I landed on D+2 at Utah Beach, Normandy, France as a replacement for Company C, 357 Inf. I fought as a rifleman from June 8, 1944 to Jan. 13, 1945, without being wounded. Any infantryman who landed in Normandy, France on June 6, 7, 8, 9, 1944, saw plenty of combat action against the enemy. An infantryman had to fire his weapon, whether it was an M1 rifle, BAR, or machine gun, at the enemy. He also had to throw hand grenades from behind one hedge, to where the enemy was taking cover, behind another hedge. At the same time, he has to seek cover behind a hedge, all the while he is being fired upon by the enemy with rifle fire, concussion grenades, machine gun fire, mortar shells, and artillery. He has to pray that he is not wounded or killed. He has to relieve himself often [pee]. When darkness falls, he has to dig a fox hole, and open a can of "c" or "k" rations. If he has a buddy near him, they take turns on guard - one sleeps 2 hrs., while the other guards, and then they switch places. This is to be sure the enemy doesn't counter attack while both are sleeping. If the enemy doesn't attack during the night, we have to attack. Some days we may take one or two hedgerows and some days we take none, while other days we have to fall back. This hedgerow fighting went on for over a month until we finally broke out of the hedgerows. It was a great relief to be able to ride atop a Patton Tank until we met resistance again. Then it was back to fighting and digging foxholes. General Patton was our commander. We hated him because he made us continue to chase the enemy after we broke out of the hedgerows. We were tired. Then our Sherman Tanks ran out of gas, and we had to park them in open fields. This is when the enemy observers saw us, and they zeroed in on us, and we were clobbered. After that, we all loved General Patton and think that he was the greatest General we ever had. We had just broken through the hedgerows of Normandy and were traveling fast, meeting no resistance.

We entered the town of St. Susanne and settled down for the night. My sergeant told me to stand in the middle of the road because B CO was coming through, and I was to tell them to go to the left at the fork in the road which was about 50 yards up the road. It was about midnight, and I heard a truck coming. Soon it was approaching me, and I said 'HALT!'. I jumped onto the running board and asked, 'B CO?' I heard the driver say 'VAS IS'. I realized then that they were Germans. I jumped off the running board and started to run toward the buildings, yelling 'JERRY'S, JERRY'S'. My squad opened fire on the truck as it started to move forward. It went about 20 feet and stopped. We counted nine soldiers in the back of the truck and three in the front seat. All were dead or dying. My sergeant removed a Lueger pistol from the dead Captain and gave it to me. We moved so fast in the breakout of Normandy that there were pockets of Germans hiding out in different locations. Most of the Germans didn't realize that we were ahead of them. This is one of the many combat experiences I was involved in."

Story 2 - "War Is Hell" "I write this June 21, 2002 because I can't sleep for thinking about WW II 58 years ago. I remember it as if it were yesterday. We were on the banks of the Moselle River and had been told earlier that we were to attack at 0500 and at 0400 the artillery, mortars, and machine guns would open fire on the enemy positions on the opposite bank. At 0400 our firing began - it stopped at 0500, and my squad climbed into pontoon boats. There were 4 - 6 men in each boat, & we had to paddle to the opposite shore to attack the enemy. While we paddled as fast as we could, the enemy sent flares into the sky, lighting up our crossing & firing mortar & artillery shells at us. My boat + some others made it to the other side. Some boats overturned due to the swollen & swift current of the Moselle. Some were hit with mortar & artillery fire. We jumped out of our boats and started to fire our rifles at the top of the bank. We received no return fire so climbed to the top of the riverbank. There we saw one of the best sites and surprises of the war. In front of us was a trench about 5 ft. deep & 2 ft. wide. It was long and curved up inland. On our right were trees, about 3-4 & 20 ft. tall. We jumped into the trench & knew we would not have to dig a foxhole that night. The Germans had retreated, so we were alone! Word came down at 1400 to be on the lookout for a counter attack & to take prisoners if the attack came. We didn't know how many there were, but they had very little cover, so we kept firing at them. Some of us who had German pistols began to throw them into the river as we didn't want to be caught with them for fear of what they would do to us. We stopped them cold - they turned and ran. As darkness came, we heard a wounded enemy soldier moaning 'ma,ma,ma' all evening. It was terrible to listen to, and if we could, we would have killed him. It was very demoralizing. At midnight, we could hear the enemy moving. They were removing their wounded and dead, which we let them do. The morning was peaceful. In the afternoon, we had several bullets hit the dirt in our trench, so we looked to see if we were being attacked. No enemy was in sight. We figured it was snipers in the trees. The 3 of us in the trench decided I was closest to the trees. I would fire a clip of bullets into the trees & move to a new position, and then the 2nd and 3rd man did the same thing. We got lucky. A sniper fell from the branch he was tied to & hung there. All 3 of us emptied our clips into him to make sure he was dead. Shortly, another sniper jumped from the trees. We could not see him. We heard someone running towards us, so I backed away from the corner. He came around a corner, & I yelled 'Hand De Hock!' [put your hands above your head]. He stopped & quickly did as ordered, a young, frightened lad with no weapons. We took our prisoner to our sergeant for questioning. The sniper never knew how lucky he was to be alive. All combat infantrymen hated and despised snipers. Snipers would hide & fire at us, sometimes wounding or killing some of our men. We had no use for them. I often think of that day & think how lucky that sniper was that we let him live. Then, I think of how lucky we were that we didn't kill him. I think that perhaps God spared me, & I lived through the war. Strange things happen in a war. I am sure other soldiers have had




