

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

Dear 90th Members,





As you all know, there was no FALL, 2014

Newsletter. WHY??? Because my regular and constant "warnings' in each newsletter that if enough members do NOT pay their dues, there will not be a newsletter, came to pass. Here are the disgraceful facts: For the fiscal year of 2014-2015, ONLY 420 out of 1781 members paid dues. For the fiscal year of 2013-2014, only 565 of 1831 members paid. Do the math: For 2014-2015, there were 54 fewer names on the roster, BUT 145 fewer members paid dues!! Your dues and 500 Club contributions pay for the newsletters. That's just the way it is. IMPORTANT NOTE: THIS ISSUE [in color, for the first time ever] HAS BEEN UNDERWRITTEN BY AN ANONYMOUS DONATION!! THANK YOU, TO THAT PERSON!!! However, we are still limited in the # of pages for the newsletter, so almost no news contributions are included in this issue. We hope to get most of them on the 90th web site in the near future. Readers, PLEASE! You NEED to let us know if the addressee on the back page is deceased. We still get notes saying the person was deceased many years ago - shame on you for continuing to receive the newsletter while never paying dues! REMEMBER! ALL NOTIFICATIONS MUST COME TO THE REIDS & NO OTHER PERSON. NOTIFICATIONS SENT ELSEWHERE MAY OR MAY NOT REACH US, AND WE ARE THE OFFICIAL CONTACT. As the years go by, we lose more and more of our treasured WW2 veterans, and in spite of several years of valiant efforts to recruit succeeding generations of 90th soldiers, we have not been successful. It is not surprising, due to the vast differences in the experiences of post WW2 solders. Think about it. Here's a history of attendance at reunions from 2004-2014: **2004**-Alexandria, VA = **781**; 2005-Corpus Christi, TX = 222; 2006-Louiville, KY = 400; 2007-Pittsburgh, PA = 381; 2008-Irving, TX = 308; 2009-Kansas City, MO = 308; 2010-New Orleans, LA = 262; 2011-Bloomington, MN = 236; 2012-Fort Worth, TX = 300; 2013-Fort Worth, TX - 184; 2014-Clayton, MO = 148 --- The number of WW2 veterans attending has dropped dramatically, due to a combination of so many answering the "Call of Taps" and illnesses and infirmities that negate ability to travel. At the 2012 reunion, we had 25 WW2 veterans; at the 2013 reunion, 22; and at the 2014 reunion, 20. At the 2005 reunion, there were 62 WW2 veterans - other years, there were more. Realistically, the numbers will continue to decline, so I encourage you sons, daughters, and other family members to bring your WW2 veteran to the 2015 reunion if at all possible. We love to honor these courageous soldiers while we are able to do so. --- This issue is dedicated to two of our finest, Gilbert Unger [WW2] and the younger Frank A. Hertzog, also a veteran. We also mourn our loss of Dona Schmidt, wife of Vern Schmidt, 2009 President. May they rest in peace. We will miss them!

GILBERT S. UNGER

DIED SEPTEMBER 19, 2014



UNGER, Gilbert S. On September 19th, Gilbert S. Unger passed away peacefully at home, short of his 90th birthday. He was surrounded by his wife and children. Gilbert was born in Dayton, OH to Abraham and Gussie Unger. He is preceded in death by his siblings, Monroe, Leon (Iris), his brother-in-law, Dr. Joseph Klausner, his beloved daughter, Dr. Rachelle Sherman, and his infant great grandsons, Shiloh and Eli Jacobson. Gilbert attended the University of Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, and the Hebrew Union College, receiving both his M.Ed. and M.M. Gilbert taught in the Dayton Public School System for 35 years as an Instrumental Music Teacher and band leader and inspired many devoted and accomplished students over the years. He was also the leader of the Gilbert Unger Orchestra and played clarinet in many other professional bands and orchestras in the Dayton area. Gilbert served as a Gunner on a halftrack in the 537th Antiaircraft Artillery of the 90th Division during WWII under General Patton. He landed on Normandy Beach and campaigned through Europe into Czechoslovakia. He stayed after the war in Weiden, Germany to help settle displaced persons and Holocaust survivors. He played in the military band during that time. For his military service, among many commendations, he received both the Purple Heart and the French Legion of Honor. In later life he became President of the 90th Division and traveled with them to Europe many times for the Anniversary celebrations of the Moselle River Crossing, He was married to the love of his life, Lois Brook Unger for 65 years. Together they raised four devoted children. Gilbert was adored by his childrens' spouses, his six wonderful grandchildren and their spouses, and eight cherished great-grandchildren as well as his many nieces and nephews. Gilbert and Lois enjoyed many years of domestic and international travel. Together they pursued a shared interest in lifelong learning. Gilbert saw himself as a simple man but, in fact, he had a profound and extraordinary impact on everyone he touched. He truly accomplished the Jewish goal of "Tikkun Olam", he left the world a better place than he found it. Funeral services for Gilbert Unger will be held in the Sanctuary of Beth Abraham Synagogue, 305 Sugar Camp Circle, Dayton, OH 45409 on Monday, September 22 at 3:00 pm officiated by Rabbi Joshua Ginsberg and Cantor Andrea Raizen. Frank Allen Hertzog September 17, 1950 - January 9, 2015



Frank Allen Hertzog, 64, beloved son, husband, father, brother, uncle, and friend passed away peacefully at his home in Eagle, Idaho on January 9, 2015 following a courageous battle with brain cancer. Frank was a hero to all who knew him and will be laid to rest with military honors at the Dallas/Ft.Worth National Cemetery. Frank loved God and country, family, and his fellow man. He was an example of goodness, wisdom, and strength and now rejoices in Heaven with his Lord and Savior Jesus Christ whom he loved and honored throughout his life.

Frank was born on September 17, 1950 in Denver, Colorado to Frank Sherman Hertzog of Maybell, Colorado and Irmgard (Jeanne) Seeanner Hertzog of Vilshofen, Germany. His parents met in Germany during World War II, married, and relocated to the U.S. where his father pursued a career in the US Army. Frank grew up the oldest of three children and lived in Ft. Riley, KS, Ft. Sill, OK, Huntsville, AL, Pirmasens and Zweibrucken, Germany, College Station, TX, and St. Louis, MO.

It was while his father was assigned to the Military Science Department at Texas A&M that Frank became a dedicated Aggie fan. Following high school graduation in 1968 from Parkway Scnior High in St. Louis, Frank entered Texas A&M's distinctive Corps of Cadets, Class of 1972. While at A&M, he was a member of the elite Freshman Drill Team and Ross Volunteers honor guard organization. Frank was awarded the title Distinguished Military Student and Graduate and commissioned into the Regular Army as an artillery officer in July 1972. He then attended Airborne and Ranger School (Fort Benning, GA) and the Field Artillery Officer's Basic Course (Fort Sill, OK).

Lt. Col. Hertzog's military service included ten years active duty and ten years reserve duty. While on active duty, he was stationed with the 1st Cavalry Division at Fort Hood, TX, with the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment in Fulda,

Germany, and with the Weapons Department of the US Army Field Artillery School at Fort Sill where he was awarded the Meritorious Service Medal. It was during his tour in Germany that he met his life partner and true love, Deborah Shaw, of Houston, TX who was a Dept. of Defense Dependent Schools (DODDS) teacher at Fulda American School. They enjoyed a fun and adventurous courtship traveling in Europe, skiing and volksmarching throughout Germany, and appearing in musical theatre productions at Downs Barracks Army Base. After returning to the states during the summer of 1978, they married on July 28, 1979 at Holy Comforter Lutheran Church in Kingwood, TX, making their first home in Lawton, OK.

While stationed at Ft. Sill, Frank completed his MBA from the University of Oklahoma in 1982, discharged from active duty, and pursued a successful sixteen year career in the health care industry while also serving in the Army Reserves (FEMA, Region VI, 5th Army). Frank was employed by American Hospital Supply (Nacogdoches, TX), American V. Mueller (Tulsa, OK; Dallas, TX), and Operating Room Division, Baxter International, and Dade Behring (Dallas, TX). In 1998 Frank retired from the reserves, was awarded a second Meritorious Service Medal, and relocated to Boise where he changed careers and became VP/Sales and Marketing of Smoke Guard, Inc. until his illness.

Most importantly, Frank was a devoted and loving husband and father. Frank and Debbie's 35 year marriage blessed them with two sons, Christian and Jeremy. Frank was actively involved in their scout troops, sporting events, canoe trips to the Quetico, academic endeavors, and church activities. He was a gifted singer who passed a love of music on to his children. Hobbies included hiking and biking, school and church choir, barbershop, and community theatre where he and Debbie most recently appeared in "Company" at Boise LittleTheatre. Frank helped form the Idaho Association of Community Theatre (IACT) and supported the 90th Division Army Association (Tough 'Ombres) on behalf of his father. Friends and family will most remember Frank's gentle spirit, laughter, and engaging conversations.

Frank was preceded in death by his mother in law, Sharon Shaw, and niece, Kaitlin St. Clair. He will be greatly missed by those he leaves behind—his parents Col onel (Retired) and Mrs. Frank S. Hertzog of Huntsville, AL, his loving wife Debbie, sons Christian (Karli) of San Antonio, TX and Jeremy of

Dona Schmidt was a dedicated wife, mother, grandmother and great-grandmother.

Dona (Buller) Schmidt was born August 1, 1926 in Marietla, OK. In 1935, she moved with her parents, Herman and Mary Buller and four brothers to Reedley, CA. She attended Reedley schools and graduated from Reedley High School in 1946. Dona studied sewing and tailoring at Reedley College.

In the Fall of 1936, Jake and Ethel Schmidt, along with sons Glenn and Vernon, invited the Buller family to attend the Full Gospel Tabernacle Church in Reedley. By 1943, Vernon was dating Dona. Their engagement was interrupted by World War II where Vernon served with the 90th Infantry Division under General Patton in Europe.

After Vernon was home six weeks, they were married on September 27, 1946. They settled in Reedley where they raised three children. In 1975, they moved to Fresno. Very soon after, Dona graduated from Federico's Beauty College as a licensed manicurist. She worked 17 years at Marion's Beauty Salon in Fresno.

After a short illness, Dona passed away peacefully on Sunday, March 8, 2015. Her beautiful smile and gentle spirit will be missed.

She has joined two brothers, Franklin and Vernon; and her parents, Herman and Mary Buller in Heaven.

Dona is survived by her loving husband of 68 years, Vernon; sons, Keith and Chris; daughter, Audrey Tarvin; four grandchildren: and six great-grandchildren.



Nazi Saved a Jewish G.I.-Wounded Bronx POW's Incredible Survival Tale

When Army Pvt. Bob Levine awoke on July 11, 1944, much of his right leg was missing.

The Nazi physician responsible was gone. too, and he had taken the soldier's dog tags with him

But in a stunning twist, the German doctor had just saved the Jewish G.I.'s life - not once, but twice.

The amputation, performed by Dr. Edgar Woll on the kitchen table of a French farmhouse, insured that the severely injured prisoner of war would not die from his wounds.

Woll's removal of the dog tags, marked with an "H" for Hebrew, insured Levine's genocidal German captors would not kill the Bronx teen because of his religion.

"He took the dog tags knowing full well that I would have got in trouble somewhere down the line," recounted Levine, now a sprightly 89, at his Teaneck, N.J., apartment. "And I believe he saved me."

Levine never got a chance to say thank you. The two men never met

But their wartime encounter forged a bond that later linked three generations of their families and lingered into the new millennium.

"It's special," said Levine. "How many guys came out of the war with this kind of connection?'

The beginning of Levine's remarkable tale offered no hint of its eventual happy ending.

Levine turned 19 shortly after arriving in England in the runup to the Allies' D-Day invasion of June 6, 1944. Levine and the rest of his 81-mm, mortar crew arrived on Utah Beach on the French coast behind the 90th Infantry.

The fighting continued for weeks, and Levine was injured during a fierce battle to seize a German-controlled hill overlooking the beach.

"Suddenly a grenade came over and caught me in my leg, right here," he recalled, grabbing his right leg above the knee. "And I looked up, and I saw this German paratrooper.

"He looked about 10 feet tall, and pointed his submachine gun at me. The kid next to me got up and took off, and he just wheeled around and shot him."

Levine, already a long way from Walton Ave., the Bronx, was now a Nazi prisoner of war.

While marching with other American prisoners behind enemy lines, a shell fired by their own troops exploded near the POWs.

The soldier alongside Levine died instantly - and absorbed most of the blast's deadly force Levine survived - and took another hit in the

"How do you live with this kind of thing?" he asks 70 years later.

In Levine's case, the answer came with the help of the dark-haired, handsome Dr. Woll. The American soldier remembers lying on the table when Woll, in a surgical mask, entered and studied his dog tags.

Levine's blood ran cold despite the summer

"He says, 'Was ist H?' - and that was all I had

to hear," Levine recalled. "I said to myself - and I can still hear myself saying it - 'There goes my 20th birthday.

"I really did not think I would make it."

At the time, all U.S. soldiers had a religious designation on their ID tags: C for Catholic, P for Protestant or H for Hebrew.

When Levine awoke, he found his leg gone and a note tucked into his shirt pocket. It was written in German on the blank side of a Nazi propaganda card; the other side bore quotes from

The soldier couldn't understand a word, but he clung to the card for months, hanging onto it while still a POW, after he was rescued by Allied troops and on the ship taking him back to the United States.

Once translated, Levine found the note explained exactly why the doctor opted for amputation and detailed his post-surgical treatment:

"Crushed right foot. Fracture of lower leg. Foreign body in upper right leg's tissue. Opening of the ankle joint. Amputation at place of fracture. Bandage with sulfa. Vaccinated against gas gangrene."

The missing dog tags likely spared Levine from Berga, a notorious camp for Jewish POWs where 350 American soldiers were worked to the bone - or the grave

Levine's wife of 63 years, Edith, believes her husband's missing limb likely meant the latter.

"I don't think they would have sent a guy with one leg to the camp," she says. "I think he would have been ... "

Her voice trails off.

Levine, who became a businessman and owned several fast-food restaurants, spent the next 37 years thinking about the German doctor. When he returned to Normandy in 1981, he met with a local historian who tracked down the Woll family in Saarbrucken, Germany.

"The doctor had died in 1954, unfortunately," Levine recalled. "But the family wanted to meet this American Jewish soldier. It was an amazing connection."

Bob and Edith, who have two daughters of their own, spent the weekend with the doctor's widow and children. They presented the widow with Woll's old handwritten note.

There was a Saturday night party, with a few drinks and a few toasts. One of the German guests raised a glass and turned to Levine.

"Bob," he declared, "without you, we'd all be saying Heil Hitler.'

The Levines returned the hospitality. When the Wolls' granddaughter attended nearby Fairleigh Dickinson University, she moved in with the New Jersey couple.

A second granddaughter was a frequent dinner guest when her husband pursued a law de-

The Levines received a family portrait last year from the Wolls when the doctor's wife turned 100. And the Woll great-granddaughters went home with souvenir T-shirts after a recent

"They became our extended family," Levine said with delight. "Isn't that amazing?"

Editor: This is a Human Interest Story from Vern Schmidt: It is the story of Jack Bulwa, a Polish Jew who was in several concentration camps, including Flossenburg. He always wanted to find a 358th soldier to thank for his rescue. and the path to Vern Schmidt is a fascinating one. Sadly, Jack did not live to see this story printed in the newsletter. Vern states: "Tom Watling, a personal friend of Jack Bulwa had Bob Campana fly his airplane to Fresno to pick me up & take me to Modesto, CA to Jack's home. We shared stories for several hours about Jack's life in at least 3 concentration camps, the last being Flossenburg and then the death march for 7 days until a jeep of the 358th stopped and picked him up. He became a U.S. citizen in 1948, never married, and served stateside during the Korean war. He suffered from ALS. The pictures were taken April 23, 2014, and Jack left on the 25th for Minnesota to be with relatives. However, that didn't work out, so Bob, Tom, & I flew to MN and brought him back to CA to his home where he was loved and cared for properly. He died there.

Jack Bulwa was born Jackob Bulwa-Moszkowicz on 4,1.26 in Piotrkow Trybunalsky, Poland to Moisze Aron and Faiga Moszkowicz, his sister was Balcia and his brother was Abram, and their address in Piotrkow was Wspolna 8.

Jack was a schuler, or student, on September 1st, 1939 when Germany quickly overran the Polish military and annexed Poland and the first Jewish Ghetto established by the Nationalist Socialist party was in Piotrkow, where Jack and his family lived, the first forced labor Jack performed soon afterward, where he would be walked from the Ghetto by German soldiers with dogs to Huta Hortencia, a glass factory. sometime during 1940, after being separated from his parents and siblings, he was sent to Tomaszow, where his job was to clean the ghetto of everything left behind by the Jewish families; all of their belongings, furniture, clothing, anything of value was packed up and sent off to Germany, in September of 1942, while at Tomaszow, Jack and the other workers could see the trains headed to the aas chambers of Treblinka and he knew that his mother, father, sister and brother were on one of those trains.

Starachowice was the next forced labor camp he was sent to, then the Concentration Camp Birkenau, where, on his left forearm he was tattooed A 18781. here they made 75-mm and 88-mm anti aircraft projectiles, nearby Auschwitz was the next camp where he worked at I.G. Farben, another ammunition factory. Buna, Munowitze Concentration Camp was next, then Sachsenhausen where they dug ditches and worked in yet another ammunition factory, then Oranienburg, again digging ditches, and finally Flossenburg, where Jack, listed as "A. 18781, a Polish Jew", was noted as prisoner number 45,589 that was taken into Konzentrationslager Flossenbürg.

after the liberation Jack spent some time in Nabburg and Weiden with the men of the 358th, working in the kitchen, helping wherever he could, befriending many of them, a typed recommencation from the 358th Headquarters recounting his ability and work effort has stayed with Jack these many years, along with signed photographs from men of the 358th who were concerned about his future.

Jack and Steven, along with many other Displaced Persons; children of up to age 19, were eventually taken to Children's Center Kloster Indersdorf, a convent turned into a school for children who had relatives outside of Germany, here they were cared for by Red Cross members, learned to read and write English and eventually they were sent to either the UK, Canada or the US. Jack left Germany in 1946 aboard the Marine Flasher, bound for New York and then on to live with relatives in Minnesota where he was enrolled in high school and worked for his uncle in a tire repair business, after joining the US Army in 1950 Jack made his way to Ft. Ord in Monterey, where he was trained as a cook, and trips to San Francisco convinced him that this was where he wanted to live and work.
